
Middle School - National Geographic Bee

Parents/Guardians,

Randolph School District encourages regular school attendance for all students and recognizes that unnecessary absences have a negative effect on school performance and academic success. However, to stop the spread of germs and illnesses it is important to keep your child home when they do not feel well. Currently, Randolph School District is seeing a high number of illnesses going around, including influenza. We need your help to prevent the spread of germs!



PLEASE:

- 1. Keep your child home from school if they are not feeling well.
- 2. Keep your child home until they have been free of vomiting and/or diarrhea for 24 hours and until he/she can keep fluids and food down
- 3. Keep your child home if they have an oral fever of 100 degrees or higher. They should remain home until they are fever-free for 24 hours without the help of fever-reducing medications.
- 4. Keep your child home if they have a constant cough, runny nose with green or yellow discharge, fatigue, and body aches.
- 5. **HANDWASHING!** Proper handwashing is the single most important method of preventing the spread of illness. Be sure all family members get into the habit of washing their hands with soap and water regularly, especially after using the bathroom and before/after eating. Remind your child(ren) to scrub their hands (front, back, thumbs, and under their fingernails) for 20 sec with soap before rinsing away with water!
- 6. Illnesses resolve much more quickly when students stay home when ill and adequate rest and fluids are provided.

I would also like to take this opportunity to mention the controversial Coronavirus. Although one case of 2019-nCov has been detected in Wisconsin, the immediate health risk to the general public in Wisconsin, and the U.S. as a whole, remains low. 



ALLIANT ENERGY GRANT

WHOLE KIDS FOUNDATION BEE GRANT

The RCF FFA was announced as the winner of a \$1500 Whole Kids Foundation Bee Grant from Texas this past December. The grant is to be used for maintenance and expansion of our twelve-hive apiary at the land laboratory. We remain as the Wisconsin's "BEE" FFA and have had nine students involved in raising bees and processing honey over the last several years. The bee SAE's began when Mitchell Miller and Austin Syvertson won National SAE Grants of \$1,000 each for raising bees.

These SAE areas are Landscape, Nursery, Turf Grass Mg't, Fruit Production, Vegetable Production, Diversified Horticulture, Specialty Animal Production, Agriculture Processing, and Forestry. Dr. Hanagriff was Sir's mentor when AET started.
