The first three quarters of the 20-21 school year have gone by quickly. One traditional activity we host will look a bit different this spring. The Week of the Young Child is coming up, April 12-16. While we are not able to host our annual Children's Festival, we are still planning dress up days, a book fair up on the stage (Tuesday preview day, Wednesday & Thursday shopping days) and an opportunity to give back and say thanks to groups of frontline workers who kept our community up and running during this pandemic. You will be receiving more information about these activities after spring break.

Additionally, after spring break, Students in grades 3-8 will be taking the Wisconsin Forward Exam. Testing must take place in the building through the month of April. If your student attends school virtually and you have questions about what days your child needs to be in the building for testing, please contact the school office for the testing schedule. Grades 3-8 take reading and math tests. Grades 4 and 8 also take science and social studies tests. Results will be shared with families in the Fall. Please contact your child's teacher or me with any other questions about the Forward Exam.

As we are entering our final quarter of the 20-21 school year, plans are underway for summer school and beyond. Summer school enrichment offerings are expanding and including some old favorites as well as new courses such as Robotics, Kindness Counts, Virtual Field Trips, and Escape Room. For students entering grades K-8, enrichment classes will take place June 7-18 from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Free breakfast will be offered and sack lunches will be available for pick up as students leave summer school at noon. Summer school registration will be online again this year and the summer school course book with descriptions will be available on or before April 16.

Summer school jumpstart reading, writing, and math is open to all students entering grades 4K-8 and will take place August 2-13 from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Free breakfast will be offered and sack lunches will be available for pick up as students leave summer school at noon.

As always, we appreciate your partnership in educating the students of Randolph.

We are in the process of finalizing our Prom details. Prom is set for Saturday, May 1st. More information will be coming soon.



JOHN & LAUREL KUENN MALE & FEMALE ATHLETES OF THE YEAR SCHOLARSHIP

For several years after John passed away, we presented the John Kuenn Male & Female Athletes of the Year a plaque in hi his honor and a \$100 scholarship to each. We added Laurel's name to the plaques upon her passing. We stopped the \$100 after several years realizing in a few years it would be gone forever. We began to let the principal grow and it has grown from just over \$1600 to nearly \$3300. We have contacted their children and there will be some added to the principal. Some Randolph residents have asked and their donations will also be added. We have a goal of \$6,000 which will allow two \$100 scholarships to be provided in perpetuity and also let the principal continue to grow. John was born on January 26, 1926, in Antigo, Wisconsin. He attended Wisconsin Rapids Lincoln High School and was a graduate of UW - La Crosse 1950 and earned an M. S. degree from UW - Madison 1967. John coached football at Upsala, Minnesota 1950-53; Eleva-Strum High School 1953-56; and Randolph High School 1956-76. His record was 109 wins, 84 losses, and 8 ties, five conference championships, and four undefeated seasons.

John coached football for 26 years. 20 years at Randolph High School. In 1982 he was in his 32nd year as a basketball coach and was named to the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1980. His basketball teams won ten championships. In twenty years as a track coach his teams won seven championships. He coached for six years winning one championship. John earned a football letter at UW - Stevens Point and a basketball letter at UW - La Crosse. He served 2 years in the Military Service between 1944 and 1946. His football teams at Randolph were ranked number two in 1964 and number one in 1965. John served on the play-off committee for two years.

Laurel was born on September 16, 1927, in Madison, Wisconsin. She graduated from Central High School in Madison and majored in physical education and art at UW - La Crosse, where she met her husband, John L. Kuenn. She began her teaching career by teaching art in the La Crosse area. She and her husband lived in Little Falls, Minnesota, and Eleva-Strum in retirement. Laurel also coached girls track and cheerleading during her years at Randolph High School.

R.E.S.O.L.V.E. To Keep Going!





This Plaque will soon hang on the wall of the Randolph Elementary School. It is the result of lots of volunteer efforts by our elementary students. R.E.S.O.L.V.E. stands for "Randolph Elementary Students Offering Love and Volunteer Efforts" and was started in the 2018-19 school year. We have held off from celebrating our efforts in the 2019-20 school year with a dedication assembly. That assembly was cancelled due to COVID restrictions put into place last March. Please stay tuned for some truly amazing things that came about during this event as we have decided that we will try to celebrate our accomplishments next Fall... when we can do it "right" and invite Patriot K9's of Wisconsin (& the dogs) to our assembly.

Though COVID has delayed last year's celebration, it has not softened our "RESOLVE to keep going". This is our third year and our RESOLVE event is going to support the Fanconi Anemia Research Fund & the PTO. More about that to come in a future article.

For now, I want our students and community to know that volunteering is a powerful way to positively impact others. 75% of the money we raised last year went to the Patriot K9's Organization of Wisconsin (25% to the PTO). Patriot K9s of Wisconsin has ear marked those funds for the purchase of new puppies that will be trained as service dogs for veterans in need. Below is an email that I received from one of those vets. We can't always see how our positive acts trickle forward, but in this case we clearly can!

Subject: Randolph Elementary

To the students and faculty at Randolph Elementary. My name is Scot. My wife's name is Lynn. We met at 16 years old. We have been married 45 years. You would like my wife. She is nice and likes to play card games and board games. We have 4 children and 7 grandchildren. I am a veteran and served my country as a helicopter crewman in the Army. I also was a police officer for 28 years. I had some very bad events happen in my life which caused depression and sad thoughts for me. It had been difficult for me to find happiness for a long time. My oldest daughter once told me that she was afraid of me as she was growing up because I always seemed depressed and lost. This made me cry when she told me. I wanted to be happy and I wanted to be around other people but I just couldn't do it.

After many years like this I went to a special doctor. He was a great doctor and a very good listener. He told me that I have Post Traumatic Stress Disorder or PTSD. I never heard of this. I was so relieved knowing it was not my fault to be this way.

Last September I connected with a group called Patriot K9's of Wisconsin. They said that they have a successful program specifically for veterans suffering from PTSD. I have seen so many different doctors and have taken many different types of medicine that I thought it would be ok to try this program that Patriot K9's had offered to me. The people there are super nice. (article to continue on next page)

I spoke to the master dog trainer, Lani. He was so excited to help me. Within a short time, he invited me to see two puppies. They were both eight weeks old Yellow Labrador Retrievers. One was called Red and the other was Blue because of their collar colors. I went there with Lynn. The puppies were beautiful and wanted to play. They were brothers. Lani had driven a long way to get to this litter of pups and there were several puppies to look at. Lani has special skills as a dog trainer and hand-picked two that were there. Lani drove all night to get back to Wausau with these two puppies.

I played with both of the puppies on the floor. We rolled around and chased each other. The puppy named Red came up to me first. He sniffed my hand and would not leave. He laid down next to me with his head on my leg and fell asleep. I knew then that he wanted me and I wanted Red as my puppy. I have not been that happy in a long time. I remember having all kinds of good feelings that day. It was such a happy time for me. My grandkids all voted on a name. We named him Buddy. Buddy and I attend training class once a week with Lani the trainer. With COVID we now do our training using FaceTime. Lani is a very good trainer.



Buddy is now 8 months old. He is very smart. Buddy had changed my life in a huge way. He is my best friend! I take care of him, feed him, walk him, we play together and when Buddy wears his special vest that says "Service Dog" he then takes care of me. Buddy reminds me to take my medicine. He keeps me safe around groups of people and he sleeps next to me at night. Night time was always bad for me. I would often wake up from nightmares and be drenched in sweat. Since having Buddy with me there have been no nightmares and I feel happy.

I wanted to share this with you. The time and devotion each one of you made in raising money to get Buddy for me is incredible. Because of you my life is so much better. It's truly a miracle that you brought Buddy to me! I don't know how to thank you for this wonderful gift. I hope Buddy and I can come to your school sometime and meet all of you.



Fighting Fanconi Anemia at RSD - Johnson Family



This year our students PreK through 12th grade banded together in a common cause... joining the battle against Fanconi Anemia. Fanconi anemia is a very rare genetic condition. That means it runs in families and is passed from parents to children. The condition can affect a child's entire body. It can cause physical problems, failure of the bone marrow and organ defects. It also increases the chance of getting some cancers, especially of the blood (leukemia).

At the Randolph School District:

Mr. Johnson is our Director of Technology. You have probably seen him around our school. He sets up and fixes your Chromebooks and IPads and helps the teachers with their computers and Smartboards. He has 2 sons, Brett and Michael, who both have a very rare blood disorder called Fanconi anemia.

Brett is a 16-year-old sophomore who loves to downhill ski in the winter and water ski in the summer. He also enjoys curling. He wants to be a computer programmer when he grows up. Brett has already programmed and hosts a Minecraft server that Michael and his friends play on. He has also programmed a website and a few other projects.

Michael is 13 years old. He loves to snowboard in the winter and wakeboard in the summer. He likes to fish and watch his friends race in various race tracks around the state. He wants to do something with marine biology when he grows up. He has a love for sharks and never gets bored of going to aquariums.

At the Randolph Elementary School:

This year our RESOLVE event was in honor of Brett and Michael. R.E.S.O.L.V.E. stands for Randolph Elementary Students Offering Love and Volunteer Efforts. However, it started well before the week, with FCCLA organizing a Door decorating contest. Brett and Michael along with 3 other judges selected the top three winners for Middle School and High School.

FCCLA, FFA, Diversity club, Student Council, NHS and Letter club hosted activities to show support to Mr. Johnson and his family as they help both boys get treatment for their rare form of anemia.

When Monday arrived, the events and support kicked into high gear. The students and staff started with dressing up in their favorite music, since Brett enjoys being in the Portage Marching Band. The Diversity club hosted "Pulling for the Johnsons," a tug-o-war tournament. The sophomore and freshman class put teams together, with both of them challenging the staff, but the staff won in the end. Tuesday we dressed in outfits that represented our hobbies, just like the boys enjoy their skiing and digital endeavors. Wednesday, the High School student council organized a "Hat Day," with students making donations to the family. Thursday, we dressed in pajamas, since the boys love to lounge around in them. National Honor Society and the Letter Club also hosted a movie night with the admission collected at the door going to the family. Each student that joined us to watch "Soul" also received a bag of popcorn, that was generously donated by Chippy's Popcorn of Beaver Dam. Friday, we wore Blue for the Fanconi Research Foundation and had the culminating event of "Kiss-A-Pig." Students had been asked all week to bring in donations to the boxes, labeled for different staff members. The top earners had to pucker up!

RANDOLPH SCHOOL DISTRICT COVID VACCINE INFORMATION

COVID-19

Despite the precautions that have been set due to COVID around the world, disruption to our lives still exists. The good news is that there are now vaccines that can help us get our lives back on track. As you read this many RSD educators have either received their first dose or have been completely vaccinated. We strongly recommend eligible people get vaccinated to add another layer of protection against COVID-19 which could protect your family, students, coworkers, and community and ultimately help RSD have continued commitment to our students.

Safety of COVID-19 Vaccines:

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has reported that COVID-19 vaccines (Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson) showed to be safe and effective through clinical trials and has approved them for Emergency Use Authorization. Clinical trials involve data from many thousands of participants. This data is reviewed by the FDA and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) by health experts. Data shows that the benefits of the vaccine outweigh the known potential risk of becoming infected with COVID or from the vaccine itself. Continued monitoring systems are in place for all vaccines to watch for possible side effects. COVID recipients are given information on how to report possible side effects from the vaccine. The COVID vaccine is not a live vaccine and cannot make you sick with COVID.

Efficacy of Vaccine:

All 3 COVID-19 vaccines have shown to be highly effective at protecting you from getting COVID, and likely the new strains of COVID, two weeks after your last dose has been administered. The interval between doses for Pfizer is 3 weeks and Moderna is 4 weeks. Johnson and Johnson is only one dose. According to what we know about previous illnesses and vaccinations along with early data from COVID clinical trials, even if you get COVID, the vaccine may help you from getting critically ill.

School Nurse News - COIVD- Vaccine Update

Phase 1c information:

On March 22, 2021, people 16 years old and older with medical conditions will be eligible for the Covid-19 vaccine. If you have any of the following health conditions, you are eligible to schedule them for a vaccine appointment. At this time, Dodge County Health Department is only able to vaccinate those 18 years old and older.

It continues to be important that fully vaccinated people follow public health guidelines in public spaces. This includes wearing a mask and physically distancing.

- Asthma (moderate-to-severe)
- Cancer
- Cerebrovascular disease (affects blood vessels and blood supply to the brain)
- · Chronic kidney disease
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
