### Richard Nieman - 2021 Inductee

At the Randolph School District Honors Night on Wednesday, May 19, 2021, we recognized our 2021 Wall Of Fame Inductee, Mr. Richard Nieman. Thank you for your contributions to the Randolph School and Community!

Richard Nieman was born in Columbus, WI, on December 29, 1947. He attended the Danville School, a one-room schoolhouse through the 2nd grade before he came to Randolph School District. His class was the 1st class to start as a freshman and attended all four years, in the newly built high school. Richard graduated in 1967.

Nieman was drafted into the Army in February 1968. He served in the Vietnam War from June 1968 to September 1969. He began his tour assigned to the 1st Division, known as the Red One, stationed north of Saigon for three months. His company was then traded to the 9th Division located in the Mekong Delta. Nieman was awarded the Purple Heart, two Bronze Star Medals, three Army Commendation Medals, and the National Defense Service Medal.

In April 1971, Richard married his next-door neighbor Karen. Together they had three sons and four grandchildren and will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary in 2021.

He worked at Busse Bros as a welder for 47 years, starting on December 7, 1969, and retiring in January 2017.

Richard has been a member of Randolph VFW Post 9510 since May 1975. He served as Commander from 1981-1982 and currently is Quartermaster, a position he has held since 1987. Richard coordinates and participates in local Military Funerals, Memorial Day Parades, organizes and cooks at the VFW Pancake Breakfasts to raise funds for scholarships to the local high school graduating seniors.

He is also a member of the Cambria American Legion.

Richard joined the Randolph Fire Department in May 1975 and retired in December 2015, after serving 40 years with 15 of those years as Assistant Fire Chief. He was voted Firefighter of the Year by his peers in 2005 and 2009. While a member of the fire department, Richard and five other members raised over \$10,000 over ten years to help with the fire department's budget by putting up the fire department's tent for different organizations and individuals. For a fireman project, Richard and other members of the fire department sided the house of a deceased fireman's wife and cut up some of her trees. Before he retired, Richard planned the menu, cooked, and prepared the food for the fireman's annual meeting.

He served on the Randolph Park Board from April 1978 to April 1981.

Richard was elected to the Village Board in April 1981 and served as a Trustee until his retirement in April 2021, after 40 years of service.

He served as a Sunday school treasurer at the local church for five years.

Richard was on the Building Planning Committee for the new addition to the current Randolph High School.

He was awarded the Randolph Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year in 2016.

Richard makes approximately 400 pounds of potato salad every year for local organizations to serve at their fundraisers.





## Randolph School District - Wall Of Fame Nomination Information

The Randolph School District Wall Of Fame seeks nominations every year from alumni, staff, friends, and family of graduates of Randolph School District. All nominations are reviewed by a seven-member committee which will make final selections. The committee includes staff members, community members, PTO members, and school board members. Nominees not selected will stay in the pool of nominees, there is no need to nominate someone every year.

Nominated candidates must meet the following criteria:

- 1. Nominees must be a graduate of Randolph High School or an individual who has made significant contributions to the success of the school district of Randolph and the residents of the district.
- 2. Graduates must be a high school graduate of at least 10 years prior to nomination.
- 3. Recommendation letters supporting the individual's nomination.

The nominee must have demonstrated a high level of achievement in his/her field and makes significant contributions to that field. The person should exhibit leadership, character, and service at work, in the community, or in civic organizations.

## Athletic Passes 2021-2022

### Randolph High School Sports Passes

For the 2021-2022 school year, there will be a Family All Sports Pass and an Individual All Sports Pass. These passes will admit the bearer to all regular home games for the entire year. The Family Sports Pass will cost \$100 and will include all immediate family members that are still living in that household. The Individual Sports Pass will cost \$35. The Couple Sports Pass will cost \$55. Year-long Game Passes can now be purchased in the High School Office for the 2021/2022 school year! A Game Pass will grant you admission to all home contests, except WIAA Tournament games. The passes are non-transferable, and must be approved by the Ticker Taker prior to entering the event. Game Passes WILL NOT be sold at contests.

### **Randolph High School Students**

All Randolph High School students will be admitted into all regular season events FREE by checking in at the admissions table. WIAA tournaments are not included.

### **Senior Citizen Passes**

The Conference sanctions a pass for senior citizens which admits the bearer to conference sponsored contests at some sites. This is a free pass which is issued by the school in the community in which the senior citizen resides. District residents who have reached the age of 65 are entitled to this pass. Please check with the High School Office. WIAA sponsored tournaments and contests are not covered by this pass.

Cross Country - The season was quite unorthodox and challenging at the beginning, with the teams being limited to small invites and wave starts at races. However, the boys relied on their upperclassmen experience and knowledge and were able to put together several PR performances to end their seasons. Having been able to coach these boys since they were freshman and sophomores it was inspiring to see them overcome the challenges of this season and accomplish all that they did.

The girls also found the start of the year to be a challenge, but discovered their stride quickly and also were able to put together very impressive performances in the last third of the season. The girls have set themselves up for a great future next season.



**Volleyball** - The varsity volleyball team had a very successful season. They finished the year 15-0 winning another conference championship, then Covid hit before the WIAA Playoffs, ending their season. At that time Randolph volleyball was moved up to D3 and ranked 3rd in the state. A clash with State Runner Up Waterloo was on the horizon. A huge thank you goes out to the JV girls and Assistant Coaches who played out the season by competing in the WIAA Playoffs for us. I also want to thank the Varsity Parents who came out to support them.


They gave Dodgeland a good run and nearly pulled it off. The Varsity team only lost 3 sets all year, 2 to D1 Kaukana and 1 to Rio. I'm so proud of how these kids reacted to all of the changes this year. The fall sports were the first teams to endure new Covid restrictions and the girls went with flow and played as if each night could be their last, until it was. With the vast majority of the team returning next year, and a move back to D4, this team is already considered one of the favorites to win a state championship. Everyone is excited to get going again!



Football - The 2020 Randolph Rocket Football team had an extremely successful year in the Pandemic. Just being able to play was amazing. Practice began on September 7. The Rockets were able to play 9 games with the final game being played on Thursday November 19th. The Rockets ended the season with 40 players on the Roster. While the focus is to win at the Varsity level, many relationships and memories were made this season. The Rockets were rated in the top 10 in the state for the whole season and did not disappoint. The Rockets averaged over 32 points a game and gave up an average of 18 points a game. Highlights included a comeback win over a very good Cambridge team and a slug-out with Oshkosh Lourdes (2nd ranked team in state) with a 17-14 Loss. The Rocket assistant coaching staff consisted of Trevor Flease, Austin Bunders, Darin Drews and Eric Doll. A special thanks to Mr. Propson for all he did to keep this season Going!!

Boys Basketball - The Randolph Boys Basketball Program had great participation numbers for the '20-'21 season, with 38 student athletes participating. The program endured the challenges of the pandemic, and made a fun and memorable season for everyone. The JV1 & JV2 teams competed at a high level all year, finishing with records of 13-8 and 11-7 respectively. Each team made great strides, and were both playing their best basketball at the end of the season. Special thanks to Coach Josh Fischer and Coach Paul Roberts for the dedication to their teams, our program and our community.





The Varsity Team finished the season with a 22-4 record, and a conference and regional championship. A very good Trailways Conference, paired with a tough non-conference schedule - made it one of the most challenging schedules in recent years. The boys met that challenge, finishing undefeated in conference play and notching some big NC wins, including wins over D2 Beaver Dam and D4 Roncalli. Special Thanks to the 8 Seniors, for their hard work commitment to our program. In the last 3 seasons, they have led us to 3 Conference Championships, 3 Regional Championships and last year's Sectional Final Appearance - a combined record of 69-8. Thank you Seniors, you will be missed.

**Girls Basketball** - The JV team was composed of seven girls and they went through the season with an undefeated 16-0 record. They did a nice job of taking care of the basketball on the offensive end and played great team defense for a majority of their season holding multiple opponents to single digits in the opening half of a lot of contests.

The Varsity team finished with an overall record of 21-4 on the season. The Rockets swept through the Trailways West Conference with an undefeated record outscoring their opponents by an average of 38 points per game. The team averaged 65.4 points per game and scored over 70 points in 13 contests. On the season the girls shot 44% from the field, 33% from behind the arc, outrebounded their opponents by almost 9 boards per game, and averaged about 13 steals per game. There was a lot of athleticism on our team and we tried to play an uptempo game as much as possible by pushing the ball up the court and extending a lot of pressure on the defensive end.

Goal #1 from the onset of the season was to win a conference championship and the girls accomplished that. They dismantled their opponents on their way to a Regional Championship. They also defeated a tough Crandon opponent in the sub Sectional before falling to eventual State Champion Mishicot in the Sectional Final.

Baseball - Hello Baseball Fans. Wow what a year, with the shorten season and double headers on top of one another. As I write this speech our record is 9 and 8 with a conference record of 4 and 2. We have put the ball in play and hit some line shots but right at guys. I am hoping in the next couple of weeks those balls fall in the gaps. We have had a solid defense with some guys filling spots where they normally wouldn't play. Our pitching staff have thrown a lot of innings and starting to throw more strikes.



We have had our ups and downs on the year. We lost a few games in which we think we should have won but we tried to learn from our mistakes and move on to the next game. I would love to keep saying Parker's favorite saying which is "we are good again" but in order to do that we have to play solid defense and minimize the errors and walks.

It's been a lot of fun with these guys. We have a big group this year and that is great to see, but in order to get better, these young men need to get in the weight room and work on their games whenever they can. I would like to see more kids playing Legion ball or Fall leagues as I have seen an improvement in the kids that play. I ask for the parents to push your young athletes, get them in the weight room, and get them in the cage. Also, I ask you to promote this sport to the young kids in our community as it all starts with our youth.

**Golf** - It was great to get back on the golf course this spring. Two of the players on our team this year were new to the game, but we were all happy to see great improvement from those two over the course of the year.

We also had two individuals that have played golf for the Randolph program early on in their high school careers. Those two individuals had a lot of successes throughout the season as well.

Perhaps the highlight of the season so far was when Cambria-Friesland and Randolph hosted their home mini meet on May 14th at Fox Lake Golf Course. Jordan Drzonek, Zach Cupery, and Brayden Haffele all had personal bests that afternoon. Jordan shot 117 and had her first par ever on the par 3 fourth hole. Zach Cupery had a terrific round of 85 and Brayden Haffele fired an 88 that afternoon and had a birdie on hole #7.

Softball - The softball team is extremely young. With the majority of the starting lineup made up of freshman and sophomores. Considering there was no season last year, all of those sophomores are also in their first year of High School Softball. Our pitchers are all first year players as well, which make it even more difficult to compete at a varsity level. However, I've been very impressed with how this team has grown. At the time of this writing we have lost to 4 teams, undefeated Princeton/Green Lake, highly rated D5 Oakfield, and as well as highly rated and upper division Lake Mills and Mayville. The girls have improved daily and recently they have started to show how talented they are, with a win against previously undefeated Princeton/Green Lake. I look forward



to seeing how far these kids will go. I want send a special thank you to Erica Ballweg-Larsen and Brianna Prieve for helping coaching.

**Track** - Some highlights have been; the Girls 4x100 has won a medal in every race they have competed in. McKenzie Kennedy and Savannah Duckett lead the girls team in points scored and races won.

The boys team has been led by the Dodge County Invite MVP Isaac Albrecht, as well as Griffin Hart, Logan Vander Galien and Aidan Bobholz.

As of May 27th, McKenzie, Isaac, Savannah, Logan

Vander Galien, and Griffin are all ranked individually in Division 3, as well as the Girls 4x100 being ranked in Division 3.

# Emergency Broadband - Mr. Craig Johnson, Technology Coordinator

On May 12, 2021, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) officially opened the Emergency Broadband Benefit Program (EBB Program) to applicants.

Many families are still struggling with everything from remote work to distance learning simply because they lack the access to the internet they need. We believe this program will help address many digital inequities that persist.

#### What the program offers:

- Up to \$50 a month discount on service and associated equipment
- Up to \$75 a month discount on for households on Tribal lands
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 on a tablet, laptop, or desktop computer
- Those eligible for the EBB program include, among others, anyone who experienced a substantial loss of income in 2020, those who qualify for SNAP benefits or the free and reduced school lunch programs, and households with incomes at or below 135% of the federal poverty guidelines. Internet Service Providers must opt-in to provide the discounts.
