




With April showers behind us and May flowers starting to bloom, warm weather is finally here. With the arrival of warmer weather, more people, including children will be playing outdoors and may be exposed to tick bites. Ticks are active in our area any time the temperature is over 40 degrees Fahrenheit. May is <a href="National Lyme Disease Awareness Month">National Lyme Disease Awareness Month</a> and I am sharing information on tick bites, prevention, and Lyme disease.

It is predicted to be an above-average year for ticks in 2021 coupled with the average number of reported cases having more than doubled over the past 10 years making Wisconsin one of the nation's hot spots for this growing concern. Ticks can be dangerous, namely, the deer tick, because it can carry Lyme's disease.

<u>Lyme disease</u> is an infection caused by the bacteria *Borrelia burgdorferi* from the bite of an infected deer tick, which is much smaller than the tick commonly found on dogs. Generally, the tick needs to stay attached for 36 to 48 hours to transmit the disease-causing bacteria. Lyme disease isn't spread from person to person, so you can't get it from someone who has it. You may not realize that you've been bitten by an infected deer tick because it's so small.







<u>Early symptoms</u> of Lyme's disease can include the infamous "bulls-eye" rash at the bite site, although a rash is not always present. You may also have flu-like symptoms, such as fever, chills, tiredness, and muscle or joint aches. People can develop a stiff neck, Bell's Palsy (a temporary paralysis usually impacting one side of the face), and if left untreated neurological and cardiac complications that can become life-threatening. Early detection and prompt treatment with prescription antibiotics can help you recover completely from Lyme disease.






### Prevention is the best policy!

- Protective clothing includes longsleeved shirts tucked into pants and long pants, tucked into socks or boots.
   Light-colored clothing makes it easier to see a tick before it bites.
- Stay on paths if possible, away from high grass or brush.
- Wear insect repellents especially designed to repel ticks. Most contain the chemical DEET. The CDC states DEET is safe and effective, but don't apply it to a child's face or hands.
- Use care with pets and check them, because they can bring ticks into the house.
- Daily tick checks are critical! Ticks can attach to any part of the body but are often found in hard-to-see areas, such as: behind the knees, armpits, scalp, in or around the ears, inside the belly button, groin, and between the toes. Shower as soon as possible after coming inside.

<u>Tick removal:</u> The attached ticks should be removed promptly, as removal within 36 hours can reduce transmission rates. Folk remedies for tick removal (petroleum jelly, nail polish, hot match) tend to be ineffective and may increase the risk of infection since it can cause the tick to regurgitate infected material into the human body. The recommended method is to simply pull the tick straight out with fine-tipped tweezers, gripping as close to the skin as possible so you remove the tick's head. Do not twist as this can cause the mouthparts to break off and stay in the skin. After removing the tick,



use rubbing alcohol to clean and disinfect the bite site and wash hands. Visit your doctor if you have a rash or fever within 30 days of removing a tick or after possible tick exposure.

<u>Tick control</u> can decrease the number of ticks in your living environment by mowing the grass short, cleaning up brush and leaf litter, elevating woodpiles, using deer fencing, creating a 3' barrier of wood chips between your lawn and any wooded areas, and place play equipment in a sunny location.

There is no better way to enjoy the warm weather than spending time outdoors, especially when done safely. I hope that you are all able to enjoy what Wisconsin outdoors has to offer.

### **Immunization Reminder:**

This is a reminder that 4K, K, and 5th-grade students have <u>state-required</u> immunizations to receive before the 2021-2022 school year. If your student is behind on their immunizations or is due to receive them, please call your child's medical provider or local Health Department (if you do not have private insurance) to make an appointment soon and avoid the late summer rush. 


