October is National Bullying Prevention Month

National Bullying Prevention Month (NBPM) is an important time to elevate the conversation about addressing and preventing bullying of K-12 children and youth.

Here in the Randolph School District we will be engaging in awareness, activities and discussions about how we can prevent bullying and promote kindness.

Bullying is the aggressive use of power, targeting another person or group of people with repeated, unwanted words or action, hurting them emotionally or physically. Bullying impacts the education, health, and safety of K-12 youth.



National Bullying Prevention Month is an opportunity to:

- Encourage our nation to take action at the local level to create safe and supportive schools, communities, and online environments
- Offer information and education, with tangible steps to address and prevent bullying
- Provide a platform to host school and community events
- Share bullying prevention information through news media, social media, videos, and print publications
- Speak with education and public policy leaders about their role in bullying prevention
- Promote dialogue between educators, parents, and students on their roles in addressing and preventing bullying
- Invite organizations to share information about their bullying prevention resources
- Inspire everyone to promote kindness, acceptance, and inclusion to help prevent bullying
- Help create a world without bullying

What you need to know:

- Bullying is a common form of violence for youth. One in five students report they have been bullied; chances are, it is happening to a young person you know and care about. And the issue affects not only the youth who are bullied, but those who witness it say the behavior impacts them as well. Witnesses to bullying report feeling less safe, helpless to stop it, and intimidated. Plus, youth who bully are at a greater risk for adverse physical or emotional health or issues with the legal system.
- Laws and policies govern bullying prevention and intervention. Every state has bullying prevention legislation and most schools have bullying prevention policies.
- Bullying can happen anywhere. It is not just a school issue; bullying can happen wherever youth come together: youth groups, athletic and academic competitions, neighborhoods, and online.
- Ignoring bullying will not make it go away. Silence and inaction are not acceptable responses to bullying. Everyone needs to be empowered with options for responding to bullying situations.
- A unified message helps amplify the conversation. It is important to reinforce the message that all students deserve to feel safe and supported, and to promote acting with kindness, acceptance, and inclusion.
- Everyone's actions matter: we all have a role to play in bullying prevention. It's vital for adults to know how to respond, to be there for those involved in bullying situations, to hold youth accountable for bullying behavior, and to support and educate youth about how to advocate for themselves and for others.

Please join us in sending the message that bullying is wrong and shouldn't happen to anyone.

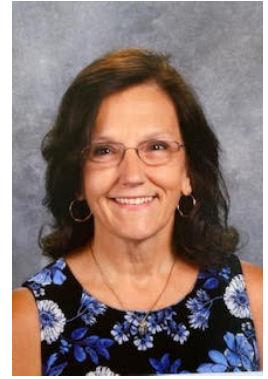

Happy October Randolph Elementary School Families,

While many of you attended parent teacher conferences on October 6, our next conference date is scheduled for November 10. By the end of the week of November 10, it is my hope that all families and teachers will have had at least one formal opportunity to discuss the needs of your individual elementary student. Please reach out prior to November 10 if you have more pressing concerns or feedback.



The 2022-2023 school year brings with it many familiar faces and some new ones. Whether former or new students, it is exciting to be a part of an organization and community that places such a high value on education. Our students continue to work hard to produce high quality work. Our staff are currently reading a book titled **Fostering Resilient Learners**, a book that helps us develop a deeper understanding of the effects of trauma on children and learning. We are also participating in professional learning and instructional coaching to get the most out of our new reading series. This reading series is more challenging than materials we've used in the past and is designed to increase student achievement when students fully engage in instruction. I encourage you to ask your students about what they are learning in school.

At the end of October we will have our traditional Fall/Halloween dress up day and parade. Because so many families have come to watch the parade in the past, our leadership team thought it would make sense to move the parade so it occurs at the end of the day. In this way families can take students home directly after the parade. Thus, dress up day for grades K-5 is Friday, October 28. Families are welcome to join us in the gym on Friday, October 28 at 2:45 p.m. to watch the parade if you choose. Dismissal will follow the parade. There will be no other dress up days for grades K-5. Since 4K does not attend school on Fridays, our 4K students will be hosting their own small Halloween Parade through the building on Monday, October 31. Please watch your child's agenda or classroom communication for specifics on each of these events.

What are My Next Steps if My Child is Not Passing Classes?

The first step to take if your student is not passing a class after you have talked to your child is to have a discussion with the teacher(s) to find out what the child and teacher think might be interfering with academic success. Contact the teacher to set up a parent/student/teacher conference. Do not wait until midterm grades come out.

The second step a parent or teacher can take when they have a concern about a student's progress in school is to have the student come in early or stay after school to ask for help from the teacher - especially in middle/high school where they have AIM after school help already built into the schedule. Coaches will understand if your student is late because they stayed after school for an academic reason.

If, after you have met with the teacher and your child has stayed after school or come in early for help with the class, your student continues to struggle, it is time to ask that a "Child Study Meeting" (CST) be held. The purpose of the CST is to review data on student progress and the effect of previous interventions to design a support system for students having difficulty in the regular classroom.

The Child Study Team is a group formed within the school to further examine a student's academic, behavioral and social-emotional progress. The team usually consists of a classroom teacher, reading teacher, school psychologist, school counselor, and often a principal from the school. Sometimes a special education teacher will also participate to give their perspective. This meeting is different from a parent-teacher conference which focuses on improving communication and addressing specific class problems. It is more focused on specific skills a student needs.

The CST meeting provides everyone with an opportunity to share concerns and develop a plan. Either a staff member or parent can make a referral to the CST. The team will determine interventions that will be monitored weekly. After a 16 week period of time, the team will review outcomes and determine next steps which could include making changes to interventions, looking for answers as to why little to no progress is made and making a formal referral for a special education evaluation.

The Child Study Team may also decide to refer your student for a Section 504 evaluation using the same process. A formal evaluation is required to determine whether the student qualifies for documented accommodations through a 504 plan. If so, the 504 team specifically details modifications needed for your student to access grade level curriculum. A 504 plan is typically used for a child who has a medical condition and requires accommodations in order to access academic instruction.

If you do not agree with the recommendations of the CST team, you still have the right to request a formal special education evaluation.

If you continue to have questions about this process, please contact Mrs. Kurtz, Mrs. Roche, or Ms. Fay for further discussion or clarification. We are happy to partner with you in meeting the needs of our Randolph Students.

Randolph School District personnel continuously review weather conditions to make the best decision based on numerous factors. A decision to hold, delay or close school is made as close to 5:30 a.m. as possible.

If a school delay is warranted, the school will begin two hours later than normal time and morning Pre-Kindergarten and Early Childhood classes will be cancelled. If school has begun and an early school closure is warranted, there will be no afternoon Pre-Kindergarten.

Parents and guardians will receive an email, call or text message through our Skylert automated messaging system notifying them of a school delay or cancellation. Then, this decision is communicated to local radio stations, TV stations, the Randolph School District website and Facebook page.

Children at the elementary/middle school are also required to go out for recess daily unless the chill factor is below zero or they have a note from their physician.

Winter Bussing Reminders

The Randolph School District asks that your children are properly dressed for cold weather when riding the bus. Although buses are heated, there is a possibility of exposure to adverse conditions if a bus experiences mechanical problems. Be advised that during foggy, icy or snowy days, buses may start five to ten minutes earlier to allow for safer travel.

In rare cases, three bus routes may run instead of four. In the event that three bus routes are being utilized, please be advised that there may be a change in pick-up or drop off times. We will inform you by sending a SkyLert email/text or a direct phone call/text. Please know that the safety of our students is of utmost priority when making these choices.



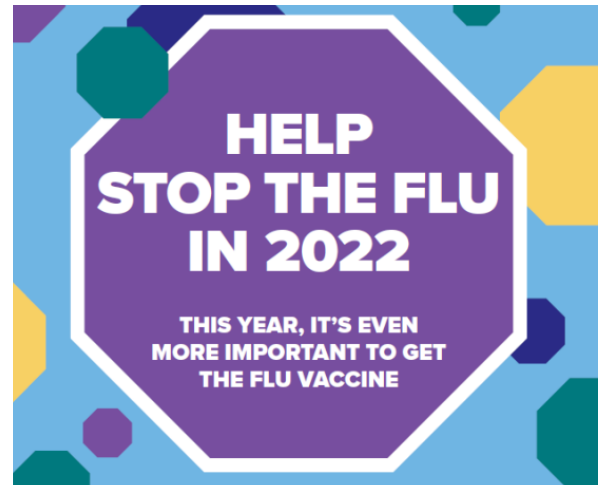

Ms. Maddie's Counseling Minutes

Hello Rocket Families! It has been so nice returning to school, and I am very much looking forward to a year full of learning, growing, and fun. I have been enjoying seeing familiar student smiles, as well as meeting new ones!

For the 2022-2023 school year, our elementary PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) theme is Star Wars! Our young jedis will be participating in activities throughout the year to think of how they can assure their school is a respectful, responsible, kind, and safe environment for everyone. Many of these activities will be completed during our monthly School Family times, in which a few students from each grade will meet in their assigned family classroom. We are very happy to reintroduce this community building format, and can't wait to see our School Families use The Force for good!

Kindergarten through fifth grade students will continue having guidance classes with me every week. Every month we focus on a PBIS word that follows the "Rocket Way", and this year we will be building off of the word that is first brought up in our School Families. In September, our word was "Respect". Students began by discussing the significance of self respect, and brainstorming reasons they deserve respect by completing "All About Me" projects. We then continued by considering the respect we should show towards other people. Classes answered questions such as "What does respect mean at home, in school, and in my community?" and "How can I show respect with my words, body, and actions?"

Seventh grade students will also be having weekly guidance classes! As the school year goes on, their Second Step Curriculum will cover the topics empathy and communication, bullying prevention, emotion management, and substance abuse prevention. Starting in the second semester, seventh graders will also return to their online Xello portfolio to continue their career and college exploration. In September, students thought about how to work in groups successfully and how to disagree in a respectful manner.



Elementary students have done a wonderful job covering all three of our topics in guidance class during October. While discussing kindness, we have completed activities that included stuffed animal tosses in kindergarten, friendship pie in first grade, and pumpkin spice (choose to be nice) lattes in third grade. Second and fifth grade classes put their writing skills to work writing genuine compliments to their peers, and fourth graders tested their patience while making origami friendship bracelets!

To recognize October as Bullying Prevention Month, we also spent a week in class talking about how we can put a stop to bullying. Students made sure they understood the definition and impact of bullying, and thought of ideas as to how they can be an upstander rather than a bystander. On Wednesday, October 19th, Unity Day was celebrated! Students and staff wore orange to vibrantly show that as a school community, we are united against bullying and promoting kindness, acceptance, and inclusion. The "United We Are Unstoppable" project elementary and middle school students created will be kept up in the hallway for the remainder of the year so we are always reminded of the type of school environment we should be making for everyone.

The last week of October will be dedicated to the word "diversity". Students will be asked to think about what makes people different from each other, and why diversity is something that we should accept and be proud of! For the month of November, elementary students will consider what it means to be **giving**, as well as how we can show **gratitude**, to those around us.

Seventh grade students continued their work on the Empathy and Communication Unit of the Second Step Curriculum in October. Skills these lessons have focused on are disagreeing respectfully, problem solving with negotiation and compromise, and how to give and get support when you need it. Bullying Prevention will again be discussed in November seventh grade guidance classes!

Please keep in mind that in addition to classroom guidance, I also support students with individual and small group counseling. If at any time during the school year you feel your child may need some additional help and care, do not hesitate to contact me!

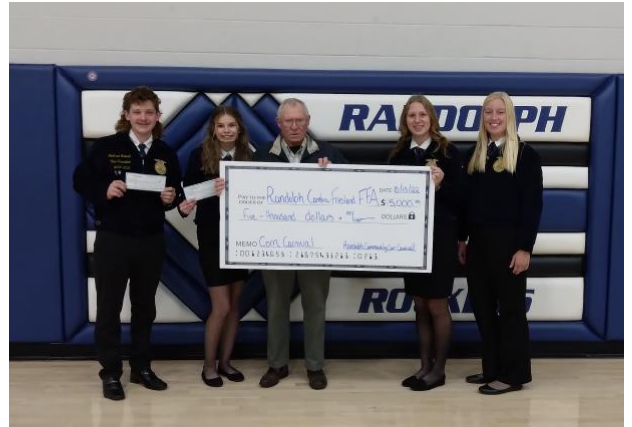
High School Happenings
