We appreciate your partnership in educating the students of Randolph. Please reach out with questions or comments.

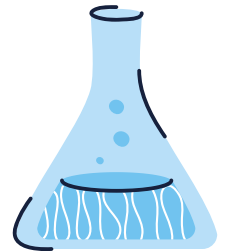
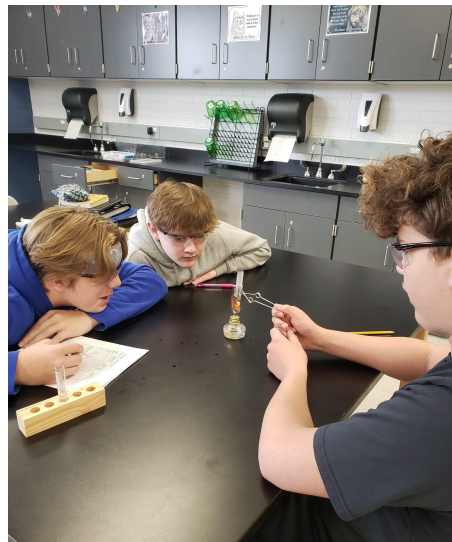
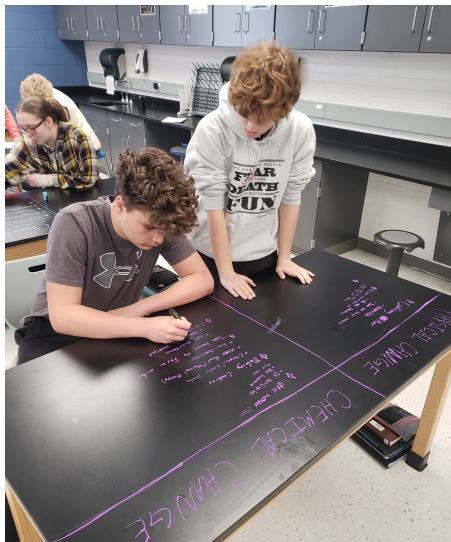
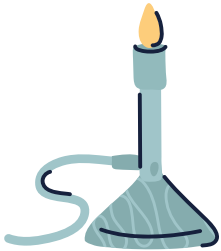

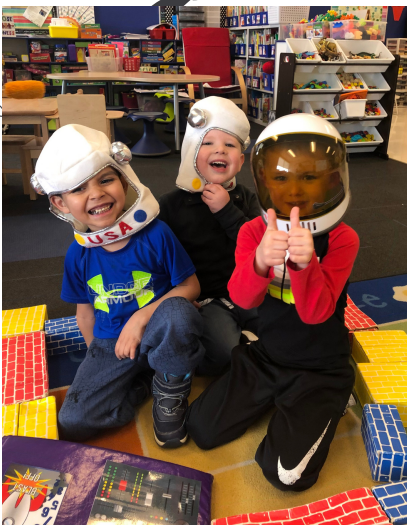
The 8th graders are currently learning about physical and chemical changes. They practiced with word problems using chalk markers on the table and then put their knowledge to use in various labs.

In addition to being healthier in general, exercise helps to reduce the risk of obesity and the health problems that come with being overweight, conditions like diabetes, heart disease, and high blood pressure. People who are physically fit feel better; they have greater self-confidence, more energy, and increase academic performance. Exercise can also improve mental health by reducing anxiety, depression, and negative mood by improving self-esteem.

We can all use a kind reminder of the importance to make physical activity a priority in our daily lives. I hope you and your family can set up a goal that works best for you to get everyone moving and bonding together.

DID YOU KNOW THERE ARE 3 FORMS OF EXERCISE?

Flexibility

Flexibility exercises lengthen and elongate muscles, tendons, and ligaments. It's so important and allows your body to feel great. Go to the local YMCA, or go out to your yard and stretch your arms and legs, your neck, your hips to ease the tension caused by everyday stress. Stretch right when you get up or right before bed!



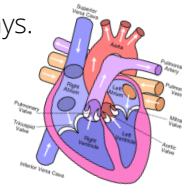
Strength & Endurance

Strength exercises improve the capability of your muscles and bones. The main goal is RESISTANCE!! These exercises can be walking with weights, using stretch bands, stretching, yoga, any type of exercise that uses resistance. Resistance is key to building muscle and even for toning. Balance and coordination is necessary for everyday tasks. If we maintain and work on balancing, our motor skills will be enhanced. We always want to maintain our level of balance.



Cardiovascular

Cardio exercise is great for your HEART!! When doing cardio exercise, it makes your heart beat faster. You can calculate your target heart rate zone by $220 - \text{your age} = \text{the target heart rate}$. Cardio exercises can be running, briskly walking, rollerblading, biking, and any exercise that gets your heart pumping! Try getting your heart rate up for 20 minutes for 5 days.



The talk test is a simple way to measure relative intensity.

As a rule of thumb, if you're doing moderate-intensity activity you can talk, but not sing, during the activity. If you're doing vigorous-intensity activity, you will not be able to say more than a few words without pausing for a breath.

How many minutes a day should be spent being active?

Adults should aim for at least 3 hours a week.

Kids should be active for at least 60 minutes a day.

Make it a family activity!

Try going for a 10-minute brisk walk, 3 times a day, 5 days a week. This will give you a total of 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity.

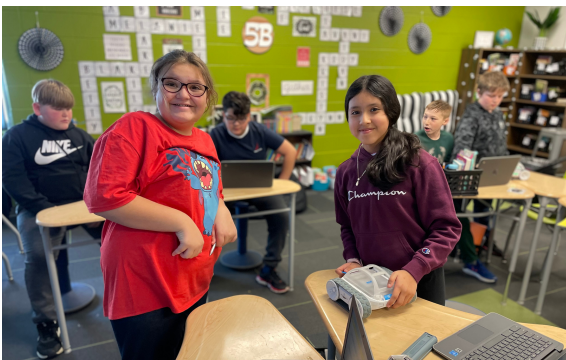

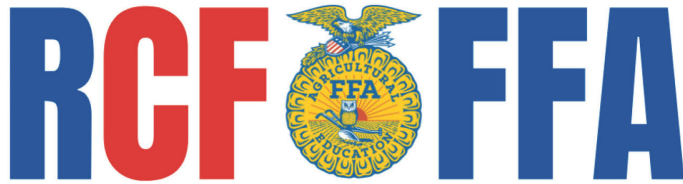
