## Elementary School News -Ms. Christy Fay, Elementary Principal

Dear Elementary Families,

First semester comes to a close with students showing us what they knowon the Star reading and math tests. The school website has details about which grade levels take which assessments. The assessments give us good information about how your child is progressing in these areas. With this information we can better



focus instruction on student needs. It also serves as a predictor of student outcomes on the Forward exam coming up in April. We also host parent/teacher conferences the week of February 16. Your child's teacher or teachers will reach out to you to set up a conference if there are concerns about the progress your child is making or perhaps to celebrate the success of your child. Not all families will be scheduled for the February conference. If you are not scheduled for a conference, but would like to meet with your child's teacher, please contact the teacher directly to set up an appointment.

One way students stay on top of their school work is by coming to school on time in the morning. I know it is warm and comfy under the blankets in the morning. However, our students are expected to be in class ready to learn by 8:10 a.m. each day. Some students are kicking the habit of tardiness. However, some students are still arriving at school after the morning bell. If your student is one who arrives late, please encourage him or her to set an alarm a bit earlier so he/she does not miss out on the first five to ten minutes of instruction. Although it may not seem like much, that is the time that teachers set the tone for the day as well as getting students organized and prepared for a full day of learning. Please encourage your child to be at school by 8:00 a.m.

We value our partnership with families in service to students. As always, please call or email the school if you have questions, concerns or feedback about your child's learning experience this school year.

## Randolph School District FREE Preschool Screening

## Friday, February 3rd

Child development screening is FREE for all preschool children who will turn 3 or 4 on or before September 1, 2023.

Children must live in the Randolph School District.

#### Screening will help

Identify health related problems and/or developmental delays that could interfere with success in school.

Provide you with information & materials to support your child's health, learning, growth and development.

Help parents develop an awareness of community-based resources and services that are available.

Screening is done by early education professionals and provides parents with immediate feedback regarding their child's development.

This screening helps to determine if further assessment is needed for your child.

If your child turns 4 on or before September 1, 2023, your child has a scheduled appointment time.

If your child will be 4 years old on or before September 1, 2023 and is not scheduled for an appointment time, please see contact information below.

If your child turns 3 on or before September 1, 2023, please see contact information below to set up an appointment time.

Vision and hearing screens will be done at the beginning of the 2023-2024 school year.

#### What is Open Enrollment?

The inter-district public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend public school in a school district other than the one in which they reside.

#### Who can apply?

Any Wisconsin resident in 4K to grade 12 may apply to attend a nonresident school district under the open enrollment program. However, a child may transfer to a nonresident school district for early childhood education or 4K only if the child's resident school district offers the same type of program and only if the child is eligible for that program in the resident school district.

#### When can parents apply?

The regular open enrollment application period for the 2023-24 school year begins on February 6, 2023, and ends at 4:00 pm on April 28, 2023. Visit the DPI website at https://<u>dpi.wi.gov/open-enrollment</u> for additional information.

An alternative application procedure allows pupils to apply for open enrollment at any time during a school year if certain criteria are met. For additional information, please visit the alternative application procedures page.

#### Can applications be denied?

Both the nonresident and resident school districts may deny an application for reasons specified in state law. If an application is denied by either the resident or nonresident school district, the parent may file an appeal with the DPI within 30 days. The DPI is required to affirm the school district's decision unless the DPI determines that the decision was arbitrary or unreasonable.

#### How do students get to school?

Parents are responsible to provide transportation to and from school in the nonresident school district, except that transportation required in a child's IEP must be provided by the nonresident school district. A nonresident or resident school district is permitted (but not required) to provide transportation to open enrolled pupils, however the nonresident school district is prohibited from picking up or dropping off a pupil within the boundaries of the pupil's resident school district unless the resident school district agrees. Low-income parents may apply to the DPI for reimbursement of a portion of their transportation costs.

**Celebrates Three Kings Day** 



For the holiday season, the students of Spanish and the members of the Spanish Club went a different route than celebrating Christmas. The centerpiece of Three Kings Day is the Rosca de Reyes, a type of elaborate sweet bread that is often decorated with dried fruit and colorful garnishes. I was asking my students where I could buy one, seeing as I am hopeless in the kitchen, when one student told me her mom was willing to MAKE one for us to enjoy! All credit and gratitude to La Señora Tapia-Ramirez for not only making it, but donating it. It is hard to tell by the picture, but it was huge, big enough for every student in the Spanish program to try a decent chunk, and for the members of the club to eat as much as they wanted. It was still very amusing to watch all the students carefully check their piece of bread to make sure they didn't get the baby in their piece and have to bring a treat for the next holiday, as per tradition!

#### What's happening in the RSD libraries?

Our 4K-6 program is promoting the very best of children's literature to your child with activities designed to help students enjoy stories as well as learn the organization of a library system. The LMC staff is dedicated to get (or keep) your children "hooked on reading" by recommending specific reading materials to all students. And, as with these 4K students, sometimes we just have fun dancing to the turkey hokey pokey.





At each grade level, students continue to learn and build upon critical thinking skills while applying their literacy and technology skills. After learning about Veterans Day, first grade students proudly displayed their listening and drawing talents through paying homage to the many Veterans within our community!

STEM and STEAM instructional lessons are incorporated in both digital and physical forms into library and technology classes allowing students to work collaboratively with others to develop and strengthen problem solving skills. Fifth grade students learned about Tony Sarg the first balloon puppeteer for the Macy's Thanksgiving Parade. After reading the book, Balloons over Broadway authored by Melissa Sweet, students constructed a few of their own fabulous creations!











Throughout the month of December, students participated in a variety of plugged and unplugged activities such as writing poetry, playing charades (Mrs. Alderdan even joined in the fun), identifying shapes, and completing a digital escape, among many other activities.



The media center programming is working with the public library to build community and form partnerships in learning. On Dec. 2, 2022, first grade students had their second field trip to the Randolph Hutchinson Memorial library where they learned how to find the library using digital sources, discussed behavioral expectations in the RHM library and other libraries, reviewed proper book care and treatment, were introduced to books that support student learning in school, reviewed where and when books and other materials can be returned, participated in story time, and completed an activity where we browsed the books and selected a few of our favorites. Now, students can come back with parents/guardians to check them out. Wow! So much to learn from Mrs. Gaastra and we thank her for her time.







Wisconsin households are eligible to place an order every month for one free test kit that contains five rapid antigen COVID-19 tests on the <u>Say Yes! COVID Test</u> website. These free self-tests are delivered right to the door, allowing people to take a COVID-19 test at home and make decisions that will keep those around them safe.

If you think any package of COVID-19 tests you have at home may be expired, check before you throw it out! The FDA has extended the expiration dates for many of the COVID-19 self-tests that are widely available at stores and pharmacies. To check if your package of COVID-19 tests has an extended expiration date, search your package's expiration <u>here</u>.

## **Elementary Guidance**

#### Ms. Maddie's Counseling Minutes

To begin 2023, elementary guidance classes took the time to cover personal safety skills with Charlie Check First and the Safety Kids Curriculum. When we were together, kindergarten through fifth grade discussed what it means to "check first", the importance of having safety people and a safety house, and practiced the freeze and yell technique in case they are ever separated from their buddy. Students defined the word "emergency" and talked about what pieces of information should be shared with an emergency operator during a 9-1-1 call. When children are ready to stay home alone, what should they do in order to stay safe and comfortable?

Additionally, students thought about their observation skills in regards to safety and considered what it means to "be wise with your eyes." What details should we pay attention to if we ever need to describe a person or vehicle to our adults at home? The final skill that was highlighted during this unit was the Power NO, which brings up a variety of scenarios in which children are encouraged to say "No!" in a firm, assertive voice so they continue to make safe choices and stay healthy. As we moved through these lessons, students should have been bringing handouts home to talk about these topics with their families. If you did not receive anything from your children relating to personal safety skills, please contact me. I stressed during class the significance of making safety plans with adults at home. The goal for these lessons is to help students feel prepared and empowered so they can always remember how to stay safe!

Seventh graders finished their Second Step Bullying Prevention Unit this past month. They also spent a class period completing a lesson on their career exploration site Xello. Students were asked to identify if they were an auditory, visual, or tactile learner, and then see how their learning style could help them in school as well as their chosen career field. In February, a speaker from Hope House will be visiting 7th grade guidance classes to present their "Let's Get Real" bullying series. Please be on the lookout for more information regarding our Hope House visitor!

Keep in mind that in addition to classroom guidance, I also support students with individual and small group counseling. I am happy to assist with referrals to our onsite therapists through the Psychotherapy Center of Waunakee too. If at any time during the school year you feel your child may need some additional help and care, do not hesitate to reach out!







If a school delay is warranted, the school will begin two hours later than normal time and morning Pre-Kindergarten and Early Childhood classes will be cancelled. If school has begun and an early school closure is warranted, there will be no afternoon Pre-Kindergarten.

Parents and guardians will receive an email, call or text message through our Skylert automated messaging system notifying them of a school delay or cancellation. Then, this decision is communicated to local radio stations, TV stations, the Randolph School District website and Facebook page.

Children at the elementary/middle school are also required to go out for recess daily unless the chill factor is below zero or they have a note from their physician.

#### **Winter Bussing Reminders**

The Randolph School District asks that your children are properly dressed for cold weather when riding the bus. Although buses are heated, there is a possibility of exposure to adverse conditions if a bus experiences mechanical problems. Be advised that during foggy, icy or snowy days, buses may start five to ten minutes earlier to allow for safer travel.

In rare cases, three bus routes may run instead of four. In the event that three bus routes are being utilized, please be advised that there may be a change in pick-up or drop off times. We will inform you by sending a SkyLert email/text or a direct phone call/text. Please know that the safety of our students is of utmost priority when making these choices.



If your student will not be riding in the morning, please call or text your bus driver the night before or call the transportation line at 920-326-2427 (option 5) to let us know. This helps to prepare our drivers for their morning bus routes. Thank you for your help!
