

From the desk of Mr. Zacho

It's a great day to be a Rocket!



Randolph students and staff have worked enthusiastically throughout the first semester of the school year. It's hard to believe that we are in the second quarter of school already and the holidays are fast approaching. It is that time of year to share a little information on what this year's State Report Card looks like.

Years back the legislation influenced how components of the report cards were weighed and how growth was measured for all school districts. As the Randolph School District focuses on helping all students achieve and maximize their full potential, the School Report Card is one source used to reflect on strengths and areas for improvement.

As part of the state accountability system, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) produces report cards for every publicly funded school and district in Wisconsin. These Accountability Report Cards include data on multiple indicators for multiple years across four Priority Areas (Student Achievement, Growth, Closing Gaps, and On-track and Post-secondary Success). In addition, given the impact on student success, the Accountability Report Cards also measure chronic absenteeism and dropout rates. A school or district's Overall Accountability Score places the school/district into one of five Overall Accountability Ratings:

The current School and District Report Cards are based on performance data from the two prior school years. Scores are assessed these priority areas:

- 1. Achievement and Growth require two years of data (2022-23 and 2021-22 required) and may use up to three years of data (including 2020-21).
- 2. The graduation, attendance, and absenteeism components in On-Track to Graduation use lagged data (from 2021-22) and absenteeism scores may use up to three years of data (including 2020-21 and 2019-20).
- 3. Target Group Outcomes follows the same rules as the Achievement, Growth, and On-Track to Graduation priority areas including lagged data as well as multiple years of data.

I have attached the District Report Card and what to look for. We use this data, but we have to be mindful that this is just one data point and we don't put all of our marbles in this one basket. We do know that this is the most used score that represents us in the public eye. Overall, the data trend that we have is going in the correct direction. Here at Randolph we are striving to make our district a better district each day we are here. Although we are heading in the right direction, we are not where we want to be, yet. However, having higher report cards from the year prior is an excellent trend that we will work hard to continue in the future. I am Kim Biel, the new school nurse! I grew up in Randolph and feel very fortunate to now be working alongside some of my former teachers!



I look forward to doing my part to help keep the students in Randolph happy and healthy!


WHEN IS SICK TOO SICK FOR SCHOOL?

FREE Preschool Screening



Child development screening is FREE for all preschool children who will turn 3 or 4 on or before September 1, 2024.

Children must live in the Randolph School District.

Screening will help

- Identify health related problems and/or developmental delays that could interfere with success in school.
- Provide you with information & materials to support your child's health, learning, growth and development.
- Help parents develop an awareness of community-based resources and services that are available.

Screening is done by early education professionals and provides parents with immediate feedback regarding their child's development.

This screening helps to determine if further assessment is needed for your child.

If your child turns <u>4</u> on or before September 1, 2024, you will be sent a notice *(in December)* with a scheduled appointment time.

If your child will be 4 years old on or before September I, 2024 and you do not receive a notice in December, please see contact information below.

If your child turns <u>3</u> on or before September 1, 2024, please contact the office *(in December)* to set up an appointment time.

Vision and hearing screens will be done at the beginning of the 2024-2025 school year.



Election Details

An election is to be held for the Randolph School District, on Tuesday, April 2, 2024. The following offices are to be elected to succeed the present incumbents listed:

Office Terms

The term of office for school board member is three years beginning on Monday, April 22, 2024 and expiring April 25, 2027. A description of the school district boundaries can be obtained in the district office of the Randolph School District.

For Candidates

A Campaign Registration Statement and a Declaration of Candidacy, must be filed no later than 5:00 p.m., on Tuesday, January 2, 2024, in the District Office of the Randolph School District. The office is located at 110 Meadowood Drive, Randolph, Wisconsin and is open from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Paperwork may also be mailed to the address noted above, or filed personally with the School District Clerk, Barb Braker.

Primary Election

If a primary is necessary, the primary will be held on Tuesday, February 20, 2024.

Additional Information

Acceptable Photo ID will be required to vote at this election. If you do not have a photo ID you may obtain a free ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.
