- A yellow flower represents someone who cares about a person with Alzheimer's.
- A purple flower represents a person who has lost a loved one to Alzheimer's
- An orange flower represents a person who supports the vision of a world without Alzheimer's. (This is the AA's mission.)
- A blue flower represents a person who is living with Alzheimer's or other dementia.

Today, this flower garden looks something like this...



However, there is a white flower. It represents the first person to survive Alzheimer's. Currently, there is not a white flower in the garden. We continue to hope and fight for the white flower to become part of the garden!
